Larson Dominates Coca-Cola 600

Hendrick Motorsports Breaks All-Time Win Record

A Great Start

Geoff Bodine sent a text to his former boss with four laps remaining in Sunday's Coca-Cola 600, reminding him the first win for the team came with the No. 5 car in 1984.

The record-breaking 269th win for Hendrick Motorsports also was in the No. 5 car.

Bodine was one of the first building blocks to what's evolved into

one of NASCAR's greatest power-

houses. Along with five crewmen, including legendary crew chief Harry Hyde, Bodine provided the most important trip to Victory Lane of them all. Without the surprise victory at the Martinsville Speedway on April 29, there wouldn't be another 268 victories and 13 Cup Series Championships.

"Rick came in on Monday and told us he was going to shut the doors," Bodine said from his home in Florida. "Harry had to talk him into doing one more race. He said we already had the car ready and an engine in it. He told Rick [Hendrick] the Bodine guy had won a few [modified] races at Martinsville. All we needed was a few dollars for some tires."

Hendrick relented and stayed in business for another week, all believing it would end with the inevitable demise of his stock-car dream. Hendrick and his wife, Linda, didn't hold much hope because they attended a church convention in Greensboro, N.C., instead of going to the racetrack.

"That was back before we had cellphones," Bodine said. "He was at the church [conference], so we had no way to tell him we won."

That single victory was enough to keep Hendrick's attention.

Now, 37 years later, Hendrick turned that fledging interest into a corporate giant that Sunday toppled Petty Enterprises as the all-time winningest teams – a spot the Pettys held for more than 60 years.

"Well, I was very fortunate when I started," Hendrick said after watching his newest superstar, Kyle Larson, lead 327 of 400 laps, including the final 49, to win NASCAR's 600-mile marathon at the Charlotte Motor Speedway. "I thought we had another deal that

was coming together that didn't, and so I was there with no sponsor, and I think we started with five people. Harry was making \$500 a week. You can put that in today's terms.

"You know, I think Randy Dorton had a little engine shop, and he came on board, and so Randy was a big part of the foundation of our company."

Bodine didn't earn a salary as a driver. He worked for a percentage of the purse.

"Did anyone know back then NASCAR was going to get to be this big? No. Did anyone know

back then Rick Hendrick was going to be this big? No. Back then, we were just racing. There were no million-dollar deals."

Bodine said the rag-tag Hendrick group celebrated by covering his house with toilet paper. The victory dinner was at Clarence's Steak and Seafood House in

Ridgeway, Virginia, just a couple minutes south of the speedway.

Bodine, now 72, said there is tremendous satisfaction of being one of the original building blocks to what now is considered the greatest organization in stock-car history. He still watches every race and cheers for all four Hendrick 2021 A New Year in Racing!

All four have won this year and have qualified for the Playoffs. Two weeks ago, at Dover International Speedway, the Hendrick cars finished 1-2-3-4, led by Bowman. At Charlotte, the Hendrick cars finished first, second, fourth and fifth.

"You know, you work hard, you hope you can pull that off and all the cars be fairly close and run the race together, and boy, I don't know what turned it on all of a sudden, but all the hard work and the cars are fast, the guys are doing a great job," Hendrick said. "Pit crews are doing well. It feels good. I can't believe we got 269. It was kind of neat too – I want any one of them to win.

crew chief who could show me how to win," he said.

Bodine said it was impossible to believe in the early days Hendrick would be successful, much less develop into the most successful teams in the sport's history. He also believes Hendrick played a significant role in building the sport by hiring drivers like Tim Richmond, Jeff Gordon and Jimmie Johnson. What started as little more than an expensive hobby has turned into a billion-dollar industry.

"The money got crazy," Bodine said.

Bodine won seven times for Hendrick before moving to Junior

cars and the Ford driven by Joey Logano. His interest in Logano is linked to his involvement in Bodine's nonprofit bobsled company, Bo-Dyn Bobsled Project that provides sled to the U.S. teams and Skelton Federation.

Hendrick's current stable of drivers includes Larson, defending Cup Series Champion Chase Elliott, William Byron and Alex Bowman.

but the first one was [No.] 5 and this one was the [No.] 5. I just remember how close it was not to finish out the first year."

Bodine wanted to be part of the original effort, even if it meant being fleeting because it gave him a chance to work with Hyde.

"When I signed up with Rick at City Chevrolet, I wanted to get with Harry Hyde. I wanted to get with a Johnson in 1990.

"I wish I could get back in the car and drive for him now because I do feel a little responsible," Bodine said.

"I've been very fortunate, too, to see Jeff Gordon, to see Jimmie Johnson, Darrell comes on board, Tim — Geoff Bodine. If he hadn't won that race in Martinsville, we wouldn't be here today."

One for the Record Books

The Memorial Day weekend is one of the biggest, most prestigious, and exciting motorsports weekends of the year. For many years, Sunday would begin with the Monaco Grand Prix Formula 1 race. Around noon, the action would turn to IndyCar and the Indianapolis 500 at The Brickyard in Indiana. The day would climax with the

NASCAR stars competing in the Coca-Cola 600 at Charlotte Motor Speedway in North Carolina.

Due to a scheduling change in F1, the Monaco Grand Prix was not run on its traditional Memorial Day weekend date this year. However, the 2021 Indy 500 and

Coca-Cola 600 provided enough history and memorable moments to "pick up the slack" of no Monaco event.

Every year, each race has its own tradition and is cherished by every competitor. To win any of these marquee races can be a "career defining" moment for any racer and team. This year was certainly no different.

Last season, both premiere races were held with no fans attending due to the pandemic. So, the fact that approximately 135,000 and 50,000 fans were able to attend Indy and Charlotte respectively was a welcomed sight and positive move. Both races were certainly enhanced with the excitement provided by having fans in those stands.

The 105th Indy 500 was the certainly memorable for Roger Penske. The 84-year old got to experience his first "real" Indy 500 being in charge. Last year, the race was postponed to August and had no fans. Penske now owns and operates Indianapolis Motor Speedway.

"I've been coming here since I was 14," Penske said. "Being able to have fans here is truly special. It's all about returning to what feels normal, what makes you feel like your life is back where you want it to be. For me, that's returning to a crowd enjoying all the events that make the Indianapolis 500 such an important part of people's lives.

And, that includes me. In the end, I'm still a race fan first."


The 2021 Indy 500 was only historic for the #16 team in particular. The Paretta Autosport Chevrolet will be the first woman driver-owner duo to race in the Indy 500. Beth Paretta is the team owner and Simona De Silvestro the driver. Neither was the first woman at Indy in their position (Maude Yagle, owner 1929 and Janet Guthrie, driver 1977), but as a team, they're the first.

Paretta Autosport will have four

of its seven over-thewall crew members. De Silvestro's two spotters were women. Two engineers will be women. And, every front office role at Paretta Autosport – from business operations to public relations to marketing to merchandising – is filled

De Silvestro, 32, is one of only three women in history to finish on the podium in IndyCar (Danica Patrick and Sarah Fisher the others). "The Indy 500 is really close to my heart. And, the older you get, the more you realize how special and important this race is." Sunday afternoon, De Silvestro finished 31st completing 169 laps.

The Indy 500 once again provided an exciting ending with a historical result.

As the drivers meeting was being adjourned on Saturday, a very exclusive club gathered around the Borg-Warner Trophy, the award for winning the Indy 500. A.J. Foyt, Al Unser, Sr., and Rick Mears, the only four-time winners of the 500 posed for photos. Suddenly, a voice in the background shouted, "No one will ever win four again".

Mears, the last to join this club when he won in 1991, very quietly said, "Don't forget. Someone has a chance to do it tomorrow." Obviously, the shouter forgot about Helio Castroneves.

One day later, Castroneves would join this elite group when he captured his fourth Indy 500. The

46 year-old driver battled Alex Palou to the finish to secure the victory. Ironically, Palou was four years old when Helio won his first Indy 500 in 2001.

"You get to the point in your career when people are nice to you, but they are also kind of feeling sorry for you," Castroneves said. "The people like you. They want you to win. But, after the years go by and there are no wins to show, they forget about you as a contender, until you give them a reason to remember you again. They will not be forgetting me after today."

"It's not the end, it's the beginning," Castroneves added. "I don't know if it's a good comparison, but Tom Brady won a Super Bowl, Phil Mickelson won the PGA and now here you go.

The old guys still got it, kicking the young guys' butts, teaching them a lesson." Several members of the broadcast team added their thoughts on the victory.

"The youngsters were playing checkers today, Helio was playing chess," Paul Tracy said.

"This is his everything. It's his Christmas, his New Year's, and even his Halloween when he gets to play Spider Man and climb the fence," Townsend Bell commented.

Perhaps Mike Tirico summed up the day best. "The headline this year – simple – the fans, they are back! 135,000 strong, the largest post-pandemic sporting event anywhere in the world."

The historic motorsports day concluded with the Coca-Cola 600 at Charlotte, NASCAR's longest race. And, as many predicted before the 400-lap test of man and machine started, Hendrick Motorsports would be the story of the day.

Kyle Larson led 327 of the 400 laps to give Hendrick Motorsports their 269th victory, the most in NASCAR Cup Series history. Hendrick was tied with Petty Enterprises going into the event.

The win was Larson's second of

the 2021 season and eighth of his Cup career. His margin of victory was 10.051-seconds over Hendrick teammate Chase Elliott. The 1-2 finish was the third straight for Hendrick Motorsports.

"It feels really good to be that guy who helped Mr. H (Hendrick) break that record finally," Larson said. "It's been better than than I ever could have imagined," Larson added. "For us to lead as many laps as we've got this year (1,105, a Cup Series best), to contend for as many wins as we have, and now to get our second win in a crownjewel event, it feels great. I'm just very lucky that Mr. H was able to put a deal together for me. It's just awesome. I've living a dream."

One of the first to congratulate Rick Hendrick was NASCAR Chairman and CEO Him France.

"I am proud to congratulate Rick Hendrick and Hendrick Motorsports on breaking the all-time wins record for a NASCAR Cup Series race team, long held by the legendary Petty Enterprises Team,: France said. "With nearly 40 years of excellence, Hendrick Motorsports has set the gold standard for race team success. Rick Hendrick has already cemented his legacy as a NASCAR Hall of Famer, and now adds another incredible accomplishment to an exemplary NASCAR career."

Ironically, Hendrick Motorsports and Petty Enterprises have interesting ties that bind them. Hendrick Motorsports was launched as All-Star Racing in 1984, the same year that Richard Petty scored the last of his record 200 wins. When Hendrick was enshrined in the NASCAR Hall of Fame in 2017, he joined the core of Petty Enterprises – Richard Petty (2010), Lee Petty (2011), Dale Inman (2012), and Maurice Petty (2014).

A great day of racing. A great day for the motorsports record book. And, a great day to honor, cherish, and remember those who paid the maximum sacrifice for each and every one of us!

Kyle Larson Delivers Record 269th Hendrick Win in Dominant Run at Charlotte

CONCORD, NC - In dominating fashion, Kyle Larson won NASCAR's longest race on Sunday night and in the process gave team owner Rick Hendrick a record 269th victory, most in

NASCAR Cup Series history.

Larson's win in the Coca-Cola 600 at Charlotte Motor Speedway was the eighth of his career and his second of the season, guaranteeing the driver of the No. 5 Chevrolet a spot in the postseason Playoffs. By the time he crossed the finish line at the end of 400 laps, Larson held a 10.051-second lead over runner-up and teammate Chase Elliott.

The 1-2 finish was the third straight for Hendrick Motorsports. Only third-place finisher Kyle Busch found a way to break up the HMS party, with Hendrick drivers William Byron and Alex Bowman

running fourth and fifth, respectively.

Larson led 327 of the 400 laps, with his only real challenges coming from Elliott and Byron, who led 22 and 19 laps.

"It feels great to be that guy who helped Mr. H break that record finally," Larson said of the victory that broke a tie with Petty Enterprises for most wins in the series.

Larson signed on with Hendrick to start the 2021 season. The car he drove to victory Sunday night bore the same number as the Chevrolet Geoff Bodine piloted at Martinsville on April 29, 1984 to give Hendrick's fledgling—and struggling—organization the first of those 269 wins.

"It's been better than I ever could have imagined," Larson said of his first 15 races with HMS. "For us to lead as many laps as we've got this year (a series-best 1,105), to contend for as many wins as we have and now to get our second win in a

crown-jewel event, too, it feels great.

"I'm just very lucky that Mr. H was able to put a deal (together) for me. It's just awesome. I'm living a dream, for sure."

NASCAR chairman and CEO Jim France was one of the first to congratulate Hendrick.

"I am proud to congratulate Rick Hendrick and all of Hendrick Motorsports on breaking the all-time wins record for a NASCAR Cup Series race team, long held by the legendary Petty Enterprises team," France said in a statement issued at the conclusion of the race.

"With nearly 40 years of excellence, Hendrick Motorsports has set the gold standard for race team success. Rick Hendrick has already cemented his legacy as a NASCAR Hall of Famer, and now adds another incredible accomplishment his NASCAR career."

Larson started from the pole and swept the first three stages, but not without challenges from teammates Elliott and Byron.

In fact, in the green-flag run after the second stage break, Byron passed Larson for the lead on Lap 231. During the subsequent exchange of pit stops, however, Larson came in for service one lap earlier than Byron and was roughly one second faster on and off pit road than his teammate.

Larson built a lead of more than 2.5 seconds but spent more than 15 circuits trying to lap the No. 43 Chevrolet of Erik Jones, as Byron closed to his bumper.


"Make him work for it," Jones' spotter, Rick Carelli, radioed to his driver as he fought to stay on the lead lap, and Jones certainly followed those instructions.

But Larson finally passed the No. 43 Camaro and began to pull away from Byron before Ryan Newman slammed the outside wall to cause the fourth and final caution of the race. The stage ended under yellow, with Larson the winner.

Coincidentally, it was also Jones who pitted for fresh tires during the final run to the finish, returned to the track ahead of Larson, and helped Larson build his winning margin.

"I just towed with him for a while and stretched my lead out," said Larson, who for the second time in his career followed three straight runner-up finishes with a pole and a victory.

Austin Dillon ran sixth, followed by Denny Hamlin, Chris Buescher, Tyler Reddick and Kevin Harvick. Hamlin retained the series lead by 76 points over Larson and Byron, who are tied for second in the standings.



Ty Gibbs Wins at Charlotte for Second NASCAR Xfinity Triumph

Not bad for a part-timer.

Ty Gibbs won his second NASCAR Xfinity Series victory in the sixth start of his career, recovering from a spin off Turn 4 to take the checkered flag in

Saturday's Alsco Uniforms 300 at Charlotte Motor Speedway.

The grandson of team owner Joe Gibbs led the final 20 laps, surviving two eventful restarts during that stretch to beat series leader Austin Cindric to the finish line by .437 seconds.

Gibbs, who won't turn 19 until Oct. 4, is the youngest winner at Charlotte in any of NASCAR's top three national divisions.

The race came down to a battle for the lead between Gibbs and Chase Briscoe, who led 30 laps before spinning off Turn 2 as Gibbs closed near his bumper and packed the air on the left rear of Briscoe's Ford.

Gibbs apologized immediately on his team radio for putting Briscoe in a precarious position.

"I wasn't trying to wreck him—I was trying to race him," Gibbs said. "That was never my intention."

After taking the checkered flag and climbing from his car, Gibbs was still apologizing, even though there was clearly no contact between his No. 54 Toyota and Briscoes's No. 99 Ford.

"First off, I just want to say sorry to the 99 and Chase and his crew," said Gibbs, who spun through the artificial turf in the tri-oval at the end of Stage 2. "I didn't hit him, but I definitely helped him out with him getting loose there, and it was not my intention. Already wrecked myself so, I just want to say sorry to them more importantly than this entire win."

But the victory nevertheless assuaged whatever guilty feelings he might have had.

"It's just awesome," Gibbs said. "I'll take it. This is a good day—we got one more (race) to go. So, I just want to say thank you all the fans out there and hell, yeah!"

Briscoe conceded that his spin was simply the product of hard racing between two quality cars. Gibbs had closed on Biscoe in traffic and had actually led the previous lap as the drivers raced side-by-side across the start/finish line.

"It felt like there at the end we just made the wrong adjustment, and I was too tight," Briscoe said. "But truthfully, Ty was probably going to get me either way.... After leading that many laps, it's frustrating for sure."

Seeking his first victory in his 99th start in the series, Daniel Hemric swept the first two stages, but a pit road mistake cost him dearly. During a pit stop under the sixth caution on Lap 121 of 200, Hemric was blocked by the Toyota

of Chad Finchum and had to back up to escape his pit stall.

That was the least of Hemric's problems. A tire rolled away from the car and impeded the pit stop of Landon Cassill, who was pitting behind Hemric. The resulting penalty sent Hemric to the back of the field.

and though he recovered to run as high as seventh, he couldn't avoid a seven-car wreck after a restart on Lap 187.

That accident knocked Hemric and Noah Gragson out of the race. After the subsequent restart on Lap 194, Gibbs pulled away from Cindric and sealed the victory, lowering his average finish in his six starts to 5.17—from an average starting position of 18.2.

Harrison Burton finished third, followed by Brandon Brown, whose crew chief, Doug Randolph, made the call of the race by saving a set of tires for the final 20 laps. Fighting for a Playoff spot and currently 13th in the series standings, Brown was outside the top 15 for the penultimate restart on Lap 187 but took advantage of his fresh rubber to charge to fourth.

Tyler Reddick came home fifth, followed by Briscoe, Ty Dillon, Brandon Jones, Jeb Burton and Jeremy Clements.

Cindric, the reigning series champion, now leads the standings by 84 points over second-place Harrison Burton.

John Hunter Nemechek Holds Off Carson Hocevar for Charlotte Victory

With his third victory of the NASCAR Camping World Truck Series season, John Hunter Nemechek reaffirmed Kyle Busch Motorsports' mastery of 1.5-mile intermedi-

ate tracks on Friday night at Charlotte Motor Speedway.

Nemechek held off Sunoco rookie Carson Hocevar over a closing 10-lap green-flag run after a violent crash at the entrance to the tri-oval stripped the body off Johnny Sauter's No. 13 Toyota and slowed the race for nine caution laps.

The victory was Nemechek's first at Charlotte and the ninth of his career. It came after the driver of the No. 4 KBM Toyota clipped the wall early in Friday's practice and ran just 10 circuits in the session.

"Hats off to all my guys, (crew chief) Eric Phillips, all my guys, everyone who works on this thing—everyone at KBM, the chassis shop, the fab shop... (owner) Kyle (Busch) for this opportunity," said Nemechek, who beat a fast-closing Hocevar to the finish line by .419 seconds. "I'm so blessed to be in this spot.

"Hopefully, we can have some fun and celebrate tonight."

Nemechek can celebrate his or-

ganization's dominance of the intermediate speedways. With his earlier victory at Las Vegas and Busch's wins at Atlanta and Kansas, Kyle Busch Motorsports has swept all four 1.5-milers so far this season.


Nemechek also collected the last of three \$50,000 Triple Truck Challenge bonuses, awarded to the winners of the designated races. He also extended his series lead to 44 points over second-place Ben Rhodes.

For his part, Hocevar apologized to his Niece Motorsports team for the inexperience that prevented him from running down Nemechek at the end.

"I've never been in that position too many times, but I let it slip away," said Hocevar, who nevertheless posted a career-best finish. "We're chipping away at it."

Rhodes ran third, followed by Stewart Friesen and Todd Gilliland, last Saturday's winner at Circuit of The Americas. Chandler Smith, Ty Majeski, Derek Kraus, Austin Hill and Zane Smith completed the top

Nemechek had a comfortable lead with 19 laps left when the No. 14 truck of Trey Hutchens III slowed to a crawl out of Turn 4 on Lap 115 of 134. Drew Dollar took evasive action, but Sauter,

screened from a view of Hutchens' Chevrolet by Dollar's truck, plowed into the stalled vehicle and destroyed both trucks.

Debris from the wreck knocked the roof camera on Nemechek's truck out of commission.

Reigning series champion Sheldon Creed handily won Stage 1 but was eliminated in a three-wide wreck with Gilliland and Chase Purdy in Turn 4 on Lap 55.

Zane Smith took the green/checkered flag at the end of Stage 2, but a penalty for a crewman over the wall too soon sent him to the back for a Lap 69 restart and ruined his winning chances.

Next up for the NASCAR Camping World Truck Series is the SpeedyCash.com 220 at Texas Motor Speedway on June 12, 2021.

NASCAR Shifts Second Race in Camping World Truck Series Playoffs to Darlington Raceway

DAYTONA BEACH, FL - Due to logistical challenges resulting from the ongoing pandemic, NASCAR has shifted the second race in the Camping World Truck Series Playoffs, originally scheduled to take place in Ontario, Canada at Canadian Tire Motorsport Park, to Darlington Raceway. The race will be the first of a Sunday Playoffs doubleheader at Darlington and will begin at its originally scheduled time (Sunday, Sept. 5, 1:30 p.m. ET, FS1).

The NASCAR Cup Series Playoffs will kick off its 10-week playoff run later that evening (6 p.m. ET, NBCSN).

The NASCAR Xfinity Series will open a trio of races at The Lady In Black on Labor Day Weekend when cars hit the track on Saturday, Sept. 4 at 3:30 p.m. ET on NBCSN, MRN and SiriusXM NASCAR Radio.

Darlington Raceway also hosted all three NASCAR national series for Throwback Weekend, May 7-9. In the Friday night NASCAR Camping World Truck Series affair, Sheldon Creed took home his first victory of 2021 after outdueling Ben Rhodes on the final two restarts of the race

The Camping World Truck Series Playoffs get underway at World Wide Technology Raceway on Friday, Aug. 20 at 9 p.m. ET on FS1, MRN and SiriusXM NASCAR Radio.

Ty Gibbs Wins General Tire 150 to Complete Charlotte Sweep

CONCORD, NC - Evidently, Ty Gibbs leading every lap in an ARCA Menards Series race is not good enough for the 18-year-old. On Saturday at Charlotte Motor Speedway, he did just that en route to his second trip to Victory Lane in one day.

Driving the No. 18 Joe Gibbs Racing Toyota, Gibbs led all 100 laps of the General Tire 150 hours after he took the checkered flag in the NASCAR Xfinity Series race.

Gibbs now has won four of the six races the ARCA Menards Series has contested in 2021. He won his second Xfinity Series race in his sixth series start.

The Saturday sweep makes Gibbs the first driver two win both an ARCA Menards Series race and a NASCAR national series race since Sam Mayer did so with ARCA Menards and NASCAR Camping World Truck Series wins at Bristol Motor Speedway last season.

"What a hell of a day right there," said Gibbs. "I can't thank everybody enough. I guess we gotta bring out the broom now; that's two

in one day. I'm tired. I might take this (car) back to my house and just take a nap."

Gibbs opened the month of May leading all 100 laps at Kansas Speedway. The 100 additional laps he led Saturday night at Charlotte give him 490 laps led in 2021, easily the most in the series.

The only other driver who has won in the ARCA Menards Series this season, Corey Heim, finished second at Charlotte after fighting his race car all day.

Heim, whose second-place finish allows him to keep his points lead over Gibbs, qualified ninth in the afternoon session ahead of the race.

"I was really disappointed with our speed and the overall handling of our car," said Heim. "It's pretty unbelievable that we finishes second, honestly, for how awful we were in practice.

"In hindsight, I think we just needed to bring a different car. We had some issues at Kansas, as well."

Two of Heim's teammates at Venturini Motorsports finished behind him, with Drew Dollar and Parker Chase ending up third and fourth, respectively.

Nick Sanchez, who at times

throughout Saturday night's race appeared to be the only driver who could compete with Gibbs, finished fifth


Sanchez passed Gibbs for the lead on a restart with 35 laps to go, but he was unable to hold off the eventual race winner by the time they reached the start/finish line.

"I think we had a left rear going down," Sanchez said of dropping to fifth after running in the top three throughout the race. "That last lap, I really felt it; I felt the rear end wiggle."

Jack Wood, Thad Moffitt, Dave Mader III, Andy Jankowiak and Chris Hacker rounded out the top 10. Not including a scheduled competition caution at the halfway point, Saturday's race featured four cautions for incidents. Moffitt spun by himself on Lap 29. Jason Miles did the same with nine laps to go.

A blown engine on D.L. Wilson's car and a flat tire on Kyle Sieg's car also brought out cautions.

The ARCA Menards Series will return to action next week at Mid-Ohio Sports Car Course in Lexington, Ohio, for the Dawn 150 on Friday, June 4. It will mark the series' 1,500th race. The Dawn 150 will broadcast live on FS1 with live streaming available on Fox Sports Go. A radio broadcast will be available on MRN and SiriusXM.

Justin Bonsignore Returns to Victory Lane at Jennerstown

JENNERSTOWN, PA - Justin Bonsignore dominated the first trip to Jennerstown Speedway last year, and let the second visit slip away.

Saturday night, the Long Island driver almost did both in the Jennerstown Salutes 150 presented by DGV. Instead, he

N. WOODSTOCK, NH - Joey Polewarczk could not be stopped down the stretch en route to the Pro All Stars Series (PASS) Super Late Model victory at White Mountain Motorsports Park on Sunday, May 23. "Joey Pole" took the lead for good with 44 laps remaining in the

150-lap event and held the division's best at arm's length for the victory to cap a doubleheader weekend of WMMP action.

Ben Rowe earned the pole in qualifying but surrendered the lead to Berwick, Ryan Green at the start. Green led the first 10 laps before Rowe went back in front. Following a lap-21 caution for Even Hallstrom's stalled automobile, point leader Johnny Clark turned up the heat, riding the outside to snatch the lead from Rowe on lap 33. Joey Pole wasn't far behind, having moved up to third from the ninth starting position.

When the second yellow flew on lap 42 for Scott McDaniel's stopped machine, it was Rowe getting the jump over Clark. The lead trio broke away from the field until lap 60, when Gabe Brown ground to a halt with a suspension failure.

Polewarczyk then decided it was

time to go, driving to the second spot after Clark slid high in turn three. A few circuits later, he swung to the high line, passing Rowe for the lead with 70 laps in the books. Pole then checked out until lap 92 when Clark cut a right-front tire and slapped the frontstretch wall.

Another yellow came out 10 laps later for debris, and Rowe gave it one more shot, putting the nose of his #4 in front for three circuits before Pole got back on top again. As Pole pulled away, Rowe and Joey Doiron went at it for 20 laps before Doiron finally cleared him to get second. Doiron was gaining on Polewarczk when the fifth caution flew for Brian Whalley's frontstretch spin with 13 laps to go.

Doiron got to restart alongside Pole, but the leader had the better short-run car and took off at the green flag. The sequence repeated itself when Green spun out with six laps to go, giving Polewarczyk his first PASS victory since 2018.

Doiron came in second while D.J. Shaw passed Rowe late in the going for third. Clark recovered from his flat tire to finish fifth. Dan Winter, Ryan Robbins, Kate Re, Justin Larsen, and Rowland Robinson Jr. rounded out the top-10.

Max Cookson made a thrilling move on the final restart to win the 50-lap PASS Modified feature. Cookson started 10th and got as

Tanner Woodard barely held off Watson, who roared back for a third-place finish. Kyle Hewins, Nate Leavitt, Matt Potter, Michael Potter, Phillips, Jaden Perry, and Renfrew came home fourth through 10th.

RJ Norton Jr. grabbed the lead at the drop of the green flag after Allstar Performance Fast Qualifier Ronnie Rose, who received a \$100 cash bonus in Memory of Gibbo Chew for his fast time, drew a six for the event's inverted start. JP Crabtree quickly caught Norton Jr. and began to apply pressure as the two battled lap after lap side by side for the top spot. CRA Announces Disqualification from Recent Tire Testing with Forensic Lab

SALEM, IN - Champion Racing Association officials announced today one driver/team has been disqualified from the ARCA/CRA Super Series Event at Anderson Speedway on May 22 at Anderson Speedway after multiple forensic laboratory tests determined the team had used illegally-altered tires during the event. The lab used by CRA for testing is the same lab used by the top racing organizations in the country, including NASCAR and the World of Outlaws

CRA officials took samples from

the top three finishers at the event, sealed the samples, signed by the teams and delivered to the independent laboratory for detailed analysis. The sample taken from the RW Motorsports car driven by Dalton Armstrong was found to not conform to the Hoosier submitted benchmark and were analyzed in duplicate to confirm the original scan result, which is laboratory pro-The duplicate results matched the original results, thus confirming the tire samples from their car did not meet the Hoosier submitted benchmark. The samples taken from the 2nd and 3rd place finishers were found to conform to the Hoosier submitted

As a result of these findings, and consistent with CRA's past procedures, a team found with non-conforming tires has been disqualified from their respective finishing position and placed on probation for one calendar year. The change in the final order for the event will result in affected teams receiving additional purse checks. Following the disqualification of the original winner, 2nd place finisher Anderson's Greg Van Alst now will be credited with the win.

Additionally, CRA will be announcing next week, new, stiffer penalties for infractions of these types. Officials are noting that the current penalty structure is not serving as a big enough deterrent, and adjustment to the penalties going forward will be made.

World of Outlaws NOS Energy Drink Sprint Car Series

Kyle Larson Follows Coca-Cola 600 Title with World of Outlaws Win

Making history is all that Kyle Larson knows how to do.

This weekend, he did just that; Beating the beat Stock Car drivers in the world and the best Sprint Car drivers in the world within a 24-hour span at two tracks 500 miles apart.

It started on Sunday evening, when "Yung Money" cashed in for a dominating crown jewel victory at Charlotte Motor Speedway's Coca-Cola 600. The Team Hendrick driver crossed the finish line for his eighth career NASCAR Cup Series win at 10:27pm.

Less than 24 later, at 10:15pm on Monday night, Larson found victory lane again at Lawrenceburg Speedway. Only this time it was aboard the Paul Silva owned #57 for his 21st career World of Outlaws NOS Energy Drink Sprint Car Series win.

He conquered the best on pavement, and the best on dirt. It was the first time in the history of Motorsports that a driver has topped both the NASCAR Cup Series and the World of Outlaws Sprint Cars in consecutive days.

"It's really cool to win that [NASCAR] Cup race last night and then come here in a totally different race car, totally different atmosphere and get it done again," Larson spoke on his remarkable accomplishment. "I think it shows that I'm in such great equipment all around from the #5 Hendrick Cup car, Paul Silva's #57 right here, and even the Late Model with Kevin Rumley. It's been a lot of fun lately."

Larson's path to a popular win at the Lawrenceburg, IN 3/8-mile wasn't exactly easy.

Yes, the Elk Grove, CA native did tear apart dirt racing with 46 total triumphs last year, 12 of those against the World of Outlaws. However, it's been much more of a struggle since the 2021 season started. Larson and Silva went 0-for-6 through Bristol, Jacksonville, I-70, and Williams Grove. They didn't just not win, they didn't even make it on the podium up to this point.

That all changed in Monday's Memorial Day Spectacular; an event Larson considers the true

start to his summer slate in Silva's Finley Farms #57.

"I'll be honest, we've really been struggling this year in the #57," Larson admitted afterwards. "Lawrenceburg is always at the right point in the season for us to get going, though. Hopefully this moves us forward in the right direction."

Starting from the outside pole of the 35-lap NOS Energy Drink Feature, Larson took the green flag with Aaron Reutzel alongside him on pole position.

Reutzel of Clute, TX bolted to the initial lead and paced the opening 10 circuits aboard the Roth Motorsports #83. The duo ran through lap traffic until Larson got the best of him on Lap 11 and slid by with an inside move through turns three and four.

Larson led from there to the finish, but it didn't come without challenges. Reutzel was mighty cutting away at his advantage with less than ten-to-go when one slip on the cushion sent his #83 for a wild flip on Lap 28 and removed him from the running.

Logan Schuchart, who set Slick Woody's QuickTime and won his Team Drydene Heat Race, was next in line and got the closest of all to the rear bumper on the #57. If it weren't for Larson's presence of mind to peep the DIRTVision big

screen down the backstretch, Schuchart quite possibly could've stolen the win away.

Ultimately, Larson beat Schuchart to the line by 0.764-seconds for the \$10,000 score.

"I actually snuck a look at the big screen and saw Logan right behind me there at the end, so I changed it up a bit," Larson mentioned on the final laps. "I wasn't sure what to do, so I just tried to take some of his air away. Lawrenceburg is such an awesome track. It's so technical with all the waves, holes, and a thick cushion. I hope all the fans had as much fun as I had driving."

Closing out the podium at Lawrenceburg was Logan Schuchart of Hanover, PA and Sheldon Haudenschild of Wooster, OH

It was a career-best finish at the high-banked track for both the Team Drydene #1S and the NOS Energy Drink #17.

"We might have to take that big board down soon." Schuchart joked. "He's a smart driver, though, I knew he either heard me or saw me coming. My heart said to fly it across the middle, but my brain told me the opposite. We've never had a top-ten here, so a second-place run is pretty good too."

"I don't know that I even needed much more from the car tonight," Haudenschild thought. "We were good, it was just about surviving this one. I'm just glad we can keep putting this NOS Energy Drink #17 up here on the podium."

Buddy Kofoid of Penngrove, CA drove the Swindell SpeedLab #39

to a career-best fourth-place finish from tenth. Closing out the the topfive and matching his season-best of fifth-place was Kerry Madsen in the Tony Stewart Racing #14.

Rounding out the top-ten was Kraig Kinser in sixth, Brad Sweet in a backup car from 24th-to-seventh, Donny Schatz in eighth, Carson Macedo in ninth, and Lachlan McHugh of Australia finishing tenth in his World of Outlaws debut.

UP NEXT: The World of Outlaws NOS Energy Drink Sprint Car Series has three days off to make the 15-hour haul west. This weekend, The Greatest Show on Dirt visits River Cities Speedway on Friday and then heads to Granite City Speedway on Saturday.

Madden's Consistency Sets Him up for Title Run

CONCORD, NC - When you look at the top of the World of Outlaws Morton Buildings Late Models standings, there's no surprise. Three-time defending champion Brandon Sheppard is #1 – literally. Second place, however, might raise an eyebrow.

Not because of the driver. Because of his starts and proximity to

Sheppard.

Chris Madden has risen to second in points – 26 points behind the reigning champion, even with missing two races – due to a consistent string of good finishes since joining the Series full-time in March.

Recently, "Smokey's" won three Morton Buildings Features in a row, including a weekend sweep at Port Royal Speedway.

The Gray Court, SC driver has four wins this season, more than any other driver. He also has more top-fives than anyone else (8) and is tied with Sheppard for the most top-10s (13).

Madden's success comes after switching to a Rocket chassis. He's been pleased with the team's results, so far.

"I'm very proud of our team and very proud of the help and the feedback we've gotten through [Mark Richards, who owns Sheppard's car]," Madden said.

Despite winning 32 Morton Buildings Features in his career, the veteran is still going through a learning curve this season.

"I've been to a lot of these [tracks], but I've never been to them in a [Rocket Chassis] before," Madden said.

"To get a basic starting point at some places has been very helpful, and there's a small group of guys on this tour that've been very helpful"

Even with all the help he's getting from Richards and his competitors, one of the keys to his success has been his crew.

"Without having a great team, and a great group of guys I bring with me, we couldn't do it," Madden said.

"A lot of the thanks and appreciation needs to go to my guys as much as to me. Ricky and Steven do a heck of a job, and they're great employees and great workers."

Madden's success in 2021 started before joining the World of Outlaws full-time. Over the winter, he won his second consecutive Drydene Xtreme DIRTcar Series championship.

But "Smokey" knows running with the World of Outlaws is a whole different animal.

"Daytime racing in the South is totally different than what we're doing out here," Madden said. "But obviously seat time is important. I don't care when it is or where it is, so seat time in the car definitely helped."

Madden may be second in points, but his goal is to stay consistent through the end of the year. He knows if he stays on the path, more wins will come.

"You'll get wins if you're consistent and competitive," Madden said. "Right now, I feel like we have been, and we've got a few wins and have been consistent. My goal is to just stay consistent with it and keep doing what we're doing."

"If I can keep myself happy and my guys happy, it'll all work out in the end."

Madden will try to keep his momentum rolling when The Most Powerful Late Models on the Planet make their sole Indiana swing of the year. The Series stops at Circle City Raceway Friday, June 4, and Plymouth Speedway Saturday, June 5.

He's a tough competitor. We kind of have grown up together, but he's a little younger than I am. It's cool seeing these young guys get big wins. The speedway crew had the racing surface awesome all weekend long. This is a fun place to race at."

Richards came home in third and was satisfied with his finish. "Hudson did a great job tonight and our hats are off to him. He's been really consistent this year. We had a really good weekend. We led early on and then went back a little. I thought we might run fifth, but we had a little bit of momentum at the end get back to third."

The triumph adds to a wildly successful weekend for the entire family, Ryan's father, Randy Timms, swept all three USRA Modified feature events for car owner Joe Duvall at the Show-Me 100 at Lucas Oil Speedway to go along with Ryan's POWRi National Midget League win on Saturday.

"I just focused on hitting my marks. Everyone was biking up, so I just raced the track," stated Ryan when asked about his approach to the race. "The car was great. My dad, Billy, Jimmy, Conner, everyone behind this team I can't thank them enough. The reds, it just got me thinking and really, just focused on saving myself so that I could be there at the end."

Eclipsing the record set by Devon Borden on June 28, 2019, at Grays Harbor Raceway at 16 years, 8 months, and 6 days, Timms held on with everything he had through a rough and wild A-Feature. Racing All Star Circuit of Champions presented by Mobil 1 victory, a 13th Series win at the Port Royal "Speed Palace," but the pilot of the ever-familiar Kreitz Racing No. 69K accomplished his first All Star triumph of season on Davey Brown's 87th birthday; one of Central Pennsylvania's legendary mechanics and the head wrench for Kreitz Racing. Dewease scored a \$29,000 payday for his efforts, as well as the coveted bull trophy.

Three-time Port Royal Speedway track champion, Logan Wagner, finished second on Monday evening, followed by leading All Star Circuit of Champions title contender, Tyler Courtney, a hard-charging Danny Dietrich, and Mike Wagner.

"He didn't come to victory lane at my 100th victory at Williams Grove. He was there, but left, so I told him we had to win this so he could be in victory lane with me because that's what it's all about," Lance Dewease said in Port Royal Speedway victory lane.

"He is 87 years old. Just think about that. And he still works on this race car and he is the drive behind this race car, working to make it go as fast as it can. If I get to that age and have that level of desire and dedication, I'll be happy."

Although Dewease, who started from eighth on the grid via top-ten redraw, led the majority of the 30lap program, his march to Bob Weikert Memorial victory lane was full of challenges, as well as a few lucky breaks. In fact, a caution on lap seven for a slowing Brent Marks initiated Dewease's first challenge for the top spot. Marks, who started fourth, had just slid leader. Hunter early race Schuerenberg, for the lead, but hard contact with the turn one and two wall forced the "Myerstown Missile" to retire. The ensuing restart saw Dewease power to the

front, utilizing the low line through turns three and four to take command before crossing back under the flagstand.

Meanwhile, Anthony Macri, a 2021 All Star winner at Bedford who started tenth on the Weikert lineup, was on the move, using a caution on lap 10 to power by two cars in a single circuit to claim second. Another caution on lap 12 allowed Macri to restart on the tailtank of the Hall of Famer.

Laps 15 through 20 resulted in an all-out war between Macri and Dewease. Attempting slider after slider, Macri eventually made a move stick, barely edging out Dewease in a drag race back to the start/finish line to complete lap 20. All momentum would halt the following lap, as a caution would set up an open red.

On the ensuing restart, Dewease charged back by Macri, utilizing the lowline through turns one and two to reclaim the point over the Dillsburg-native. Refusing to give up, Macri hounded Dewease yet again, returning to the cushion with hopes of powering around the Kreitz Racing entry. Unfortunately for Macri, massive contact with the turn three wall ended his efforts on lap 26; he would be

forced to leave on the hook.

Without further challenges, Lance Dewease drove on to claim the five-figure payday.

"Anthony is really good here. He pounds the wall hard," Lance Dewease continued.

"He was going to have to really earn it to get back by me. I guess he hit the wall too many times. We were really good on restarts. I could get into the corner flat out. I knew Anthony wasn't going to go down to block me. He probably thought he wasn't going to have to worry about me

"It's great to be here racing in the sunshine. Port Royal does such a fantastic job. I'm just really happy to be here."

SONOMA, CA For the first time in almost two years, the
North Bay will be
transformed into
Thunder Bay as the
sights and sounds of
NASCAR make their
long-awaited return to
the twisting, turning
layout of Sonoma
Raceway, June 5-6.

The Toyota/Save Mart 350 NASCAR Cup Series race will mark NASCAR's first race in the state of California in more than

15 months and the first race in Sonoma in nearly two years.

The return of racing at Sonoma Raceway also signals the return of race fans to the facility as well. Sonoma County authorities have given the green light to host a reduced capacity crowd that will be thirsting for the roar of engines.

No one will be more excited to get back to the 12-turn, 2.52-mile road course than Martin Truex Jr. The 2017 NASCAR Champion has won the past two Cup races in Sonoma and will be trying to join Jeff Gordon as just the second driver to ever win three races in a row at Sonoma. Gordon won the 1998, 1999 and 2000 Toyota/Save Mart 300s.

"I've been waiting for a while to go back to Sonoma and try to get the three-peat," Truex said. "Sonoma is such a fun track and it's a great part of the country. It's beautiful and always great weather. I can't wait to get there and see all of our fans in California that we haven't seen in quite a while."

More impressively for Truex, is he has won the past two races on two different configurations. The 2018 race marked the final race for "The Chute", which was introduced in 1998 and shortened the track to 1.949 miles and eliminated the famous Carousel. The Carousel, which will be in use again this year, returned to the track layout in 2019. Truex and legendary racer Ricky Rudd are the only two drivers to win NASCAR Cup races on both layouts.

Other storylines to watch include Chase Elliott's pursuit of Jeff Gordon's career road course win record. Gordon won a NASCAR-record nine road course races during his career. Elliott, the defending series champion, picked up his sixth career road course victory at Circuit of the American in Austin just a week ago.

There will be a distinct California feel to the race as well as five native Californians are expected to compete in the Toyota/Save Mart 350. Kyle Larson (Elk Grove), Kevin Harvick (Bakersfield), Matt DiBenedetto (Grass Valley), Tyler Reddick (Corning) and Cole Custer (Ladera Ranch) make up more than 10 percent of the starting field.

This year's event is a one-day show for the NASCAR Cup Series as there will be no practice or qualifying due to previously established limitations issued by NASCAR on the duration of race weekends due to Covid-19 precautions.

However, there will still be plenty of racing action throughout the weekend as the General Tire 200 for the ARCA Menards Series West hits the track on Saturday. In addition, the Historic Trans Am Series will compete in timed races on Saturday and Sunday and will feature NASCAR on Fox lead announcer Mike Joy trading in his tie and microphone for a driving suit and a steering wheel.

The General Tire 200 is set to start at 2 p.m. on Saturday, June 5 and Sunday's Toyota/Save Mart 350 will begin at 1 p.m. on Sunday, June 6. Sunday's race will be televised live on Fox Sports 1.

At Selinsgrove Speedway, Williamson's lone championship was in 1978. His first win in a super sprint car at the track was on Sept. 3, 1973, and his last was on Aug. 10, 1981. He is tied with Barry Camp of Beavertown for the ninth

spot on the track's all-time win list for super sprint cars with 25 career victories.

During the latter part of his career, Williamson had been touring on the URC circuit. He scored a single URC win at Selinsgrove on July 8, 1995, which was the last time he won a race at his former home track. In all, Williamson recorded 67 career wins and three championships with URC.

Mark Smith of Sunbury has won five of the seven Kramer Cups, with victories in last year's race along with checkered flags in 2014, 2016, 2017, and 2018. Robbie Stillwaggon of Burlington, N.J., scored the prestigious win in 2015 and Ryan Smith of Kunkletown was the 2019 winner.

When he experienced a mechanical issue in his #23 car several weeks ago, he turned to an old friend, Andy Marchese and took over the driving duties of the #5 Marchese Landscaping Chevrolet. After a disappointing 19th place finish on May 14th where Gambacorta had to deal with 2 flat tires during the race, he came back on May 21st and drove the #5 car to NAPA Victory Lane for his first feature win nearly 2 years to the day

with his last win coming on June 7, 2019.

"A couple weeks ago in practice I broke a spindle in my car," said Gambacorta. "In the process of starting to get things fixed, I got to thinking about my future in the Late Model division and I needed to come up with a plan on where I wanted to go before I got trapped in a box. Andy is a good friend of mine and I knew his

car was only a year or two old and it has the best of everything on it. Andy agreed to let me drive his car so I called Bob Fill and told him what the plan was and asked if he would work with me. Bob was on board and originally I was looking to get 3 races and see if I liked everything and if it worked for me but now my deal with Andy is I'm going to drive the #5 car for the rest of the season. I just sold my #23 car and our plan is to start building a second car that will be a twin to the car that Andy has now so we have 2 cars for next season."

Normally any time a driver changes cars it takes time to get used to the feel and handling characteristics of the car, but for Gambacorta the transition from his #23 car to Marchese's #5 car was an almost seamless transition.

"I had a feeling the first week I drove the car that if we didn't have 2 flat tires that we would have had a good shot at winning that race," said Gambacorta. "I felt very comfortable in the car and I was able to drive back through the field even though we were a lap down. I had been doubting myself because it was almost 2 years since I last won a race but that race helped me get my confidence back. I was telling myself right before that first race in Andy's car that I might go out and finish 15th or something like that and it might be a couple of races before I got comfortable in that car. I've run the same car for the last 15 years in the Limited Late Model and then Late Model divisions so I figured if I had the chance to try something new without going out and buying everything first then I should take advantage of that opportunity."

Gambacorta's new ride not only has him feeling confident about winning races again, but it has also helped alleviate the stress of running his own team with very little crew help.

"The last 2 races, I've been more relaxed at the track than I've ever been before," said Gambacorta. "Bob [Fill] comes down after every practice to look at the car and he made a change on the car before the feature last week just as I was getting strapped in. I have no idea what he did and I guess I don't really care what it was because it worked and I don't have to worry about that stuff any more. Alex Grab is working with me on tires, so I don't have to worry about that either. Normally I'd get out of the car after a practice round or heat race and I'd have no one to lean on so I'd be thinking about maybe check this or change that and I'd be all over the place. It's a lot more relaxed now."

With a renewed confidence and less stress at the track, Gambacorta is now targeting more feature wins as well as making a run at the Late Model championship. Gambacorta is only 28 points, or 14 positions on the track, behind Michael Wray for the Late Model points lead and he is looking to become the first driver in Stafford history to win track championships in three different divisions.

"I think as long as we have good luck we should be a top-5 car every week," said Gambacorta, "We obviously want to win more races and right now we're only 28 points out of the lead so Andy is excited to go try to run for a championship. I've wanted to win a Late Model championship for a long time now and Andy would be more than thrilled to win a championship as a car owner so that's kind of where our talk is right now. Andy has really good equipment and I have good people all around me so now if I struggle, we can keep things going in the right direction. I have to thank all my sponsors, Lavigne Law, Life-Care Family Chiropractic, Cold Creek Tavern, Hometown Pizza, Conventional Builders, CT Axle and Spindle Service, Marchese Landscaping, Right Image Signs, Neil's Fine Wine and Liquors, and Auto Machine. We didn't have them on the car last week, which I felt really bad about, but they'll all be on the car this Friday and for the rest of the season.
